About This Manual

The purpose of this manual is to help you carry out system maintenance functions for the MicroComm DXI system.

It is strongly recommended that you read Sections 2 to 4 of the Intercom Master Station Operating Instructions Manual before you begin to read this manual.

The MicroComm DXI

The MicroComm DXI is an intercom system that is designed to help correctional officers communicate with inmates and other staff members. The system handles alarms as well as two-way voice communication between Intercom Stations and Master Stations

Elements of the System

The DXI consists of:

- intercom stations,
- *master stations* to which intercom stations are connected.
- a *SAC computer* (Service, Administration and Control computer), which drives the DXI system and is also used for system administration and maintenance,
- paging outputs from PAB, TAB, and AOB channels,
- audio input/output from AIO, AIB, and AOB channels,
- card cage and power supplies,
- hardware cards for card cages (ACB, AIB, AIO, AOB, DIO, PAB, RDB, RRB, SAB, TLB, TSB),
- other hardware (DIO, FDH, FTR, IMS's, ICM's, MAI, RRB, RRR, SPC/SPD, RNS, TIS, VSB).

All of these elements are linked together on a communications networks. If there is more than one SAC computer they will be linked by an Ethernet Network, while the SAC computer sends control signals to the various cards over a LonWorks network.

You will use the SAC Computer to perform system maintenance functions.

System Maintenance Functions

System maintenance functions include:

- initial set up of the hardware configuration for your DXI installation,
- making changes to the hardware configuration as required,
- swapping hardware components,
- using data logging features to observe or review system activity,
- checking that the system elements are functioning properly, and
- performing system diagnostic tests.

Hardware Configuration

The hardware configuration consists of specifying the physical components used to build your system. It defines the exchanges, cards, master stations, stations, etc. and their physical addresses and ID numbers.

Examples of system hardware parameters include:

• *exchange definitions* - identifying the number of SAC computers you have in your system and giving each one a unique identity,

- card definitions identifying the cards and types of cards and giving each a unique identity and location,
- master station definitions identifying your intercom master stations, and
- station definitions identifying each station and where it is physically connected within the system.

The hardware configuration must be completed before you set up the software configuration. The software configuration consists of giving user defined names to intercom stations, master stations, paging zones, etc. It also sets up the relationships on how the components will work with each other - such as who can call who, setting priority levels, defining default volume levels, etc.

Swapping Components

Some DXI components contain local intelligence and a unique identity so that they perform the functions assigned in the software configuration. These include intercom master stations, discrete I/O modules, audio control boards, and remote receiver and driver units. When the system is initially installed, these units must be given an identity corresponding to that in the hardware configuration. Similarly, if any of these components are removed for service, the replacement unit must be told what its identity is.

The above processes are referred to as returning a card to service and swapping cards.

Data Logging

The DXI logs all system activity at the SAC computer. These log messages may be reviewed through the SAC computer monitor. They may also be printed, so that hard copy is available, and copied to text files for use on other computers.

System activity consists of a series of events such as:

- the beginning of a call,
- the end of a call,
- a time-out alarm, and
- fault reporting.

Each event occurs at a particular point in time. The log is a record of these events and the time at which they occurred. Further details are contained in Section 8 - Data Logging.

Diagnostic Functions

The SAC computer can also be used to perform some system diagnostic functions. These include:

- checking the operating status of the system's networks,
- fixing network communication problems,
- performing self tests on cards,
- performing detailed diagnostic tests on cards, and
- manually activating and deactivating outputs to verify their performance.

Section 2 - Getting Started

In this Section...

We will discuss:

- system maintenance functions
- the Service Administration and Control (SAC) computer

Elements of the DXI system - from the user's point of view - are described in Sections 2 to 4 of the "Intercom Master Station Operating Instructions Manual". You should read and fully understand this material before you begin to perform systems maintenance functions.

System Maintenance Functions

System Maintenance is a key aspect of the successful operation of your DXI system. The role of the system maintainer may involve:

- specifying the initial hardware configuration of the system being installed
- making modifications to the hardware configuration as required, on an on-going basis
- swapping components that need to be removed for service
- verifying the proper operation of the system, and
- monitoring the logged data.

The system maintainer will use the SAC computer to perform these functions.

SAC Computer

The Service, Administration and Control (SAC) computer is the brain of the DXI system. It:

- controls the operation of the DXI system, and
- is used for installation, administration and troubleshooting.

The SAC computer is a standard IBM-compatible PC with special operating software and network adapters for communication with other parts of the intercom system.

The SAC computer has the following software installed:

- QNX V4.2X operating system. QNX is a standard commercial operating system, UNIX like but can be used in real time applications.
- DXI MicroComm system software to control the DXI system.

As an option, a redundant SAC computer can be added so that 100% backup is assured. With this option the system can operate on either PC and will switch automatically from one to the other if the need arises.

Configuration Data

There are two major components to the DXI system - the hardware and the software.

The hardware consists of the Exchanges, Cards, Master Stations and Intercom Stations, other types of Stations (e.g. monitor and control points) along with associated wiring. Those items that are hardware-dependent (i.e., that depend on the type or number of components or the actual wiring) are controlled by the *hardware configuration*.

The software makes the system operate. Those items that can be changed without making physical changes to the system (without adding or removing components or rewiring) are controlled by the *software configuration*.

Both the hardware configuration and software configuration must be specified before the system will operate. Configuration data are entered into the SAC computer. The system installer and maintainer specify the hardware configuration. The system administrator specifies the software configuration.

Parameters That Are Specified as Part of the Hardware Configuration

The following hardware items are configured when your system is installed, or when your system is modified. Each of these hardware items has a list of parameters that must be specified for the system to operate properly. A detailed list of the parameters and their purpose is given in Section 5, where screen displays of the various Modify Hardware selections made under the *Edit* function are presented.

- Exchanges
- Cards
- Tones
- Music
- Masters
- Stations
- Doors
- Switch Panels
- CEPTs
- Radios
- Messages
- Globals

Passwords

Access to the DXI system through the SAC computer is password-protected. The System Administrator will set and control passwords. The system uses five passwords:

- one for access to the "Administration" module, which is used to specify and change the software configuration,
- one for access to the "Maintenance" module, which is used for installation, troubleshooting and maintenance functions,

- one to regain access to the system after the screen saver cuts in,
- one for access to the operating system ("system"), and

• one to allow Station names to be changed from the DXI *Shell* by using the *Options* menu selection. In some facilities it is convenient to have the Station name the same as the client located there, and give the authority to make these changes to personnel other than the System Administrator.

Who Needs Passwords

The purpose of passwords is to ensure that only authorized personnel have access to the DXI system through the SAC. Personnel who must know a specific password are:

- personnel who must access the *administration module* will need to know the password for access to the administration module,
- personnel who must access the maintenance module will need to know the password for access to the maintenance module,
- all personnel who use the system will need to know the screen saver password, and
- personnel who must access the *operating system* (QNX) will need to know the password for access to the system module.
- personnel who need to change Station names (e.g. the name may correspond to the name of the client at that Station) will need access to the Stnnames password.

Note: Only qualified personnel should use passwords.

It is important that all personnel who access the system protect the security of the system.

Guidelines for Managing Passwords

Passwords should only be issued on a "need-to-know" basis.

All personnel who know one or more of the passwords should follow these guidelines.

- Do not disclose passwords to unauthorized persons.
- Do not leave written passwords in places that are not secure. (It is better to commit passwords to memory.)
- When personnel change, new passwords should be established.
- Do not re-use old passwords.
- When your work is finished, exit to the DXI main menu.

Section 3 - Using the SAC Computer

In This Section...

We will discuss:

- the structure of the SAC computer software,
- how you may access the system and modules within the system,
- typical screen layout,
- screen saver, and
- how to access the maintenance module.

Structure of the SAC Computer Software

The DXI SAC computer software is modular in design. At the highest level is the "shell". Once you are in the shell, a main menu is presented with four options - *Administration*, *Maintenance*, *Options* and *System*. When you make your selection, further menus are presented, from which you go further into the system.

You go down the tree by selecting functions - to select a function, press the letter key that is highlighted - until you reach the screen that enables you to perform the desired function.


At any time, you may retrace your path back up the tree by pressing the 'Escape' key.

SAC Startup


When you boot up the SAC computer after a short time the following screen will appear on the monitor.

Normally, you would ignore this message, and after the indicated time has elapsed, Auto-start will commence.


However, if the system will not re-boot (this might happen after you have made changes to the configuration) this gives you an opportunity to revert to a known good configuration. Key in 'x', and the start-up will abort. Now you can select *Options*. (For more information on this procedure, see how to use the *Options* selection in the *Default Configurations* sub-section.)



If you do not abort, after the indicated time ("tt") has elapsed, Auto Start begins by first loading the hardware and software configurations. The following screen is displayed:




Once the configuration has been loaded the screen displays the following message:



When Auto Start is complete, the DXI shell main menu is displayed:

The main menu presents four selections: *Administration*, *Maintenance*, *Options* and *System*. (Most of the times, when you start to use the SAC computer the DXI *Shell* menu will be displayed.)

Default Configurations

The default configuration is the set of hardware and software configurations that the DXI system will use when it is turned on. Therefore, these are usually the current operating configurations. In order to provide automatic recovery after a power failure the DXI will restart using these configurations by default.


If the system will not boot up, the Options menu may be used to revert to a known good configuration (hardware configuration, software configuration or both).

Note: It is **extremely** unlikely that the computer will not boot up. This would occur only after you have made changes to the configuration, and the changes cause an unrecoverable error.

When you select *Options*, the following menu appears:

Set Defaults allows you to change the hardware and/or software configuration.


Auto-start takes you back to the boot-up process. You should change the configuration before you return to Auto-start.



Set Defaults

When you select this option, you will first be prompted for a hardware configuration.

"Hardware cfg file name" is the name of the current hardware configuration. In this example it is hw_demo). The default hardware configuration will be displayed. Key in name of the hardware configuration you want to use and press 'Enter' (The hardware configuration you enter must be on the hard drive). See the next sub-Section for recommended restrictions on file names.



You will now be prompted for a software configuration.

"Software cfg file name" is the name of the current software configuration (In this example it is **sw_demo**). Key in the name of the software configuration you want to use and press 'Enter' (The software configuration you enter must be on the hard drive).

```
Hardware cfg file name: hw_demo

The following screen will then appear.

"User cfg file name" is the name of the current user configuration (In this case there is no user configuration file). This file unlike the hardware and software configuration files is optional. Key in the name of the user configuration you want to use and press 'Enter' (The user configuration you enter must be on the hard drive). If no user configuration file exists, hit the 'Spacebar' followed by the 'Enter' key to continue.

The *Options* menu will re-appear, and you can select *Auto-start*.

File names

Since the files used for either a hardware or software configuration can be stored on floppy disks, it is recommended the DOS restrictions be used for file names:

- no spaces,
- file name 8 characters in length (longer is acceptable but it will be truncated if stored on a floppy),
- All alphanumeric characters are acceptable. Alphabetic characters are case sensitive,
- no control characters,
- can use the underscore " " characters,
- cannot use "*" or "/" characters,
- It is recommended that the character set be restricted to:

ABCDEFGHIJKLMNOPQRSTUVWXYZ

abc defghijklm nop qr stuv w xyz

Become Alternate

The *Become Alternate* selection allows you to tell the active computer (the one you are using) to become dormant, causing the redundant SAC computer to become the active SAC computer. If you press 'B' in the Options selection and there is no redundant computer in the configuration you will obtain the following screen:

Using the DXI Shell

Now you may select the module that you wish to access. There are four options. Note that the message at top right of the screen (*DXI Shell*) tells you what part of the system you are in:

Screen Layout

DXI system menu screens are laid out as follows:

- The bar at top of screen displays the main menu for the module that you have selected
- The message at the upper right (on bar) shows where you are in the system, e.g., "DXI *Shell*"
- Messages at bottom of screen are for prompts, errors, etc., e.g., "Enter DXI Admin password"


Accessing Modules


To select an option, key in the letter that is highlighted (e.g., for Maintenance, key in 'M'). If you select Administration, Maintenance or System, you will be prompted for a password. (Typing either 'M' or 'm' will select the Maintenance menu, i.e. the selection characters are not case sensitive.)

When you make your selection, the system will prompt you for a password, if one is required.

Key in the password and press 'Enter'.


If the password is incorrect, an error message will appear at the bottom of the screen and the PC will give a beep sound.





If the password you have entered is correct a message "Password correct" will appear briefly at the bottom of the screen,



followed by the menu screen for the module you have selected (in this case the Maintenance module screen).



Maintenance Module

The maintenance module is used for configuration file functions; editing the hardware configuration; viewing, saving and/or printing log data; and performing system diagnostic and maintenance functions.

You can now select the function that you want. If you select Exit, you will return to the DXI Shell.

Select	If you want to
File	Load, save, backup, or restore a hardware configuration
Edit	Specify or modify the hardware configuration
Maint	Perform diagnostic and maintenance functions
View	Check on the network status
Log	View, save, and/or print log data
Exit	Return to the DXI Shell

To select a function, press the highlighted key. A menu will be presented for the function you have selected.

The Default Hardware Configuration

When the system boots up, it loads the "default" hardware configuration, which is stored on the hard drive, into the memory of the SAC computer. This is the configuration that is used to operate the system.

The default configuration is the configuration that was most recently "saved" or "loaded",

• When you modify the hardware configuration (using the *Edit* function), the configuration that is in memory, operating the system (the "current" configuration) is updated immediately, as you enter changes. However, the default configuration is not updated to reflect your changes until the current configuration is "saved". The system will prompt you to save the current configuration as you exit from the *Edit* function.


If you do not save the current configuration, and you have to restart the system, the default configuration will be loaded from the hard drive. The current configuration is lost.

At any time, you may load a configuration from the hard drive into memory. The configuration that you load overwrites the current configuration and becomes the new default configuration.

Screen saver

Normally, when you are working in the DXI system, you should exit as soon as you have completed the functions(s) you intended to perform.

If for some reason, you are in the system and you do not perform any keystrokes within a given time ("screen saver timeout"), the system will revert to "screen saver" mode. The screen will darken, and a message will appear that floats around the screen.



The main purpose of screen saver is to protect the screen on the monitor. It also prevents access to the system by unauthorized people if the SAC computer is left unattended.

Once the system is in screen saver mode, you are locked out. To re-access the system, press any key. You will be prompted for the screen saver password.

Key in the password and press 'Enter'. If

the password is accepted the following message will appear.

After pressing the 'Enter' key you will return to the place where you were working when screen saver was activated.

Screen saver Time-out

This is the elapsed time before the screen saver is activated, if no keys are pressed. The System Administrator sets this parameter.

Section 4 - Procedures for Loading, Saving, Backing up and Restoring the Hardware Configuration

In This Section...

We will:

- examine the entries for *File* selection in the Maintenance module, and
- set out procedures for loading, saving, backing up and restoring a hardware configuration.


Configuration File Functions (FILE)

The DXI allows more than one hardware configuration to be stored on the hard drive. The file function is used to manage hardware configurations. You may:

- *load* a configuration from the hard drive into memory. The configuration that you load becomes the new default configuration
- *save* a configuration. This function saves the current configuration as the new default configuration. The system will prompt you to do this whenever you exit from the Edit function, if you have made changes.
- *back up* a configuration. This will copy the default hardware (and software) configuration(s) to floppy disk.
- *restore* a configuration. You may select a configuration from the floppy disk and store it on the hard drive. The configuration that you restore does not become the default configuration until it is loaded.

When you select the *File* from the main menu of the DXI *Maint* module, these options will be presented;

To select *Load Hardware*, *Save Hardware*, *Backup to Disk* or *Restore From Disk*, press the highlighted key.



Load Hardware

Remember that when you *load* a hardware configuration, it becomes the default configuration.

When you select *Load Hardware*, the following screen will appear. The default hardware configuration file will be displayed on the screen. You can overwrite this entry if you wish to load a different hardware configuration file.

Hardware cfg file to load: hw_demo

Press the 'Enter' key and the screen will appear as shown on the right. Now the software configuration file can be typed in to overwrite the default software configuration that is initially displayed.

Hardware cfg file to load: hw_demo
Software cfg file to load: sw_demo

Once the software configuration is specified press the 'Enter' key and as the hardware configuration is loaded the following screen will be displayed:

Press any key to continue and the software configuration will be loaded. Once the software configuration has been loaded a "Sending configuration to the nodes..." message will appear at the bottom of the screen.

The configuration you selected will now be operative. You will return to the Maint menu.

Save Hardware

Remember when you *save* a hardware configuration it becomes the default configuration. Normally you will do this after you have made changes to the hardware configuration.

When you select *Save Hardware*, the following screen will appear:

Key in the name of the configuration file you want to save to and press 'Enter'.

Remember the name of the previous configuration file since you may need to revert back if the new configuration causes problems.

The current configuration is saved to the specified configuration file. It becomes the new default configuration. After pressing the 'Enter' key you will return to the Maintenance menu.

Backup to Disk

The *Backup to Disk* function will save the default hardware (and software) configuration(s) to a floppy disk.

When you select *Backup to Disk*, the following screen will appear:

Select 'Y' (yes) or 'N' (no) and press 'Enter'.

If you select 'Y', the default configurations are copied to disk, and the following message will appear on the screen:

Restore from Disk

Remember that when you *restore* a software configuration from a floppy disk it is stored on the hard drive. It does not become the default configuration unless it is loaded.

When you select *Restore from Disk*, the following screen will appear:

Use the ↑or ↓ arrow keys to toggle between the Floppy and Hard Drive. (The selected Drive will be highlighted.)

Section 5 - Modifying and Viewing the Hardware Configuration, Setting Alarm Thresholds and PCLTA Operating Characteristics



Editing Functions (EDIT)

The editing functions are used to specify and modify the hardware configuration.

When you select the *Edit* function, the following options will be presented:




Note: The *View Hardware* function is not described in this manual. The *Modify Hardware* functions and *View Hardware* functions are similar except that no changes can be made when *View Hardware* is selected.

Modify Hardware

You will need to use the modify functions:

- during system setup, and
- whenever the hardware configuration is changed.

When you select Modify Hardware, the "database prompt" screen will appear as shown on the right. Using the Left-arrow and Right-arrow keys you may now select *Exchange*, *Card*, *Tone*, *Music*, *Master*, *Station*, *Door*, *Switch Panel*, *CEPT*, *Radio Messages*, *Globals* or *Exit*. When you make your selection, the data entry screen for the database you have selected will appear.



Exchange allows you to specify or modify the hardware configuration for an exchange.

Card allows you to specify or modify the hardware configuration for a card.

Tone allows you to specify or modify the configuration for a signal tone.

Music allows you to specify or modify the configuration for a music program source.Master allows you to specify or modify the hardware configuration for a master station.

Station allows you to specify or modify the configuration for a station.

Door allows you to specify or modify the configuration for a door monitor and control

station.

Switch Panel allows you to specify or modify the configuration for a switch panel.

CEPT allows you to specify the CEPT network.

Radio allows you to specify or modify a radio.

Message allows you to specify or modify messages

Globals sets parameters that are common to all hardware devices

If you are installing the system, you must specify parameters for all of the above (if they apply to your system). If you are modifying the hardware configuration you must specify parameters only for those items that are affected by the change(s).

Function Keys

Once you have selected a hardware device (i.e. exchange, card) a data field for the selected item will appear. The following keys are used on the data entry screens to move from field to field, from record to record and from page to page. The same keys are used to edit all settings.

Down Arrow, Enter will move you to the next field

Up Arrow will move you to the previous field

Home will take you to the next page for that device (if there is more than one page per

record)

PgDn will take you to the next device, same page

PgUp will take you to the previous device, same page

End will take you back to the modify menu.

F1 Help - will bring up an on-line help screen for the selected item

F2 search for device by ID number

F3 search for device by name

F8 renumber devices (used for Station configurations only)

F9 to Delete an ID number to a selected database

F10 to Add an ID number to a selected database

To Select a Different Device

If you want to select a different device, use PgDn or PgUp to page through the devices until you find the one you want.

Quick Search for a particular device

The function keys F2 and F3 can help you quickly find a particular device without paging through a long list. The function key F2 does an ID search while function key F3 carries out a name search.

If we press 'F2' the following screen will appear:

You can then type in the ID number of the device you want to select and press 'Enter'. The screen display for the device with that ID number will be immediately displayed.

You can also do a search using the F3 function key. If you press 'F3' the following highlighted box will appear:

You can then type in the name of the device (or part of the name) you want to select and press 'Enter'.

On-line Help

The help function key ("F1") allows you to view an on-line help screen. If you are viewing a screen and have moved the cursor to select a particular parameter, pressing the function key 'F1' will bring up a screen describing that parameter. As an example if we were viewing Page 1 of a Master database we would have a screen presentation similar to the following:

When you have finished

As you are making changes to the database for the selected devices the current hardware configuration is updated as you enter changes.

When you have completed specifications of or changes to the device, press 'End' and you will return to the database prompt. You may now access other devices where you want to change the database.

When you have completed the hardware configuration for all hardware devices, select 'Exit', and press 'Enter'. If the changes you have made affect any hardware settings, the message "Sending configuration to nodes" will appear at the bottom of the screen. There will be a slight delay while this takes place.

When the configuration had been sent to nodes, the screen will clear, and you will be prompted to save the new hardware configuration.

There are two types of LonTalk Adapters. The first is the PCLTA card (PC LonTalk Adapter), which is an ISA card installed in the computer. The connectors for this are on the back of the computer. 




Alarm Thresholds

Selecting *Alarm Thresholds* will bring up a menu that allows you to set a boundary for the frequency characteristics of an audio signal that will automatically trigger an alarm. If detected sounds meet or exceed these preset limits then an alarm will be generated. The screen appears as shown on the right.

Block Diagram of ALA



The above block diagram gives an overview of the filter operation that provides the ALA function. Input parameters determine the type of filter, bandwidth and center frequency. The output samples from the filter are squared to provide a power measure of the signal strength. A moving sum of these values is continuously calculated. If the moving sum exceeds the threshold value an alarm condition is generated. The filter is arranged so that both a long term moving average and a short term moving average can be calculated. Either one of the moving averages can generate an alarm condition.

The sampling rate for the incoming audio signals is the telephone standard 8 kHz. This sampling frequency can be used to transmit clear voice quality audio providing the incoming audio is limit to signals below 4 kHz. Analog filters are used to limit the frequency content of the incoming audio to less than 4 kHz. This filtering means that the ALA function can be used set threshold conditions for audio signals whose frequency spectrum falls within the 350 to 3500 Hertz range.



Selftest Card


This function can be used to check whether a Master Station, DIO card or SPC card is operating properly. It might be used when you are checking out the complete system and want to see if a particular card is talking properly on the network and operating correctly. A number of quick tests, which are not extensive or exhaustive, are run.

- the master self test performs a test on the CPU, network, LCD display RAM, and keyboard. It does not test the audio circuits, keyboard keys, beeper or backlighting (to test these features, you would conduct a functional test, using the test card function), external inputs, or relay outputs.
- the DIO self test performs tests on the CPU, network, and digital inputs to ensure that multiplexers and voltage references are operating properly. It does not test the actual inputs or outputs (to test these features, you would conduct a functional test, using the test card function)
- the SPC self test performs tests on the CPU, network, and the SPC card to verify that the card is communicating properly with the SAC computer. It does not test the actual inputs or outputs (to test these features, you would conduct a functional test, using the test card function)
- The RDB and RRB self test performs tests on the CPU, memory, and CEPT controller. It does not test the CEPT cabling or driver circuitry. To test these features you would conduct a functional test using the test card function.

These are diagnostic tests. A card that does not pass a self-test should be replaced.


Test Card

Master station functional test

This function tests the LCD display, the keyboard keys, beeper and backlighting. The test steps through the functions as follows:

- 1. The LCD display displays the alphabet "A" "Z", one letter at a time.
- 2. A keypad test screen is displayed. The operator presses each key on the keypad. Pressing a key on the keyboard will display the key code on the LCD display.
- 3. After testing the keypad, you must press the key labeled 'END' on the menu or the 'D' key twice within 1 second.
- 4. The next test is the buzzer test. The operator is given a menu with four options:
- Pressing menu 'BUZ1' starts a 30 second test of the beeper. During the beeper test use the Up-arrow and Down-arrow keys to adjust the volume of the beeper.
- Pressing the menu 'EXT1' or 'EXT2' activates the external relay contacts on the DB25 connector.

- Pressing the menu 'END' move to the next test.
- 5. The watchdog reset test causes the unit to reset. It then starts up as it normally would if the power had just been turned on.

DIO functional test

This tests the inputs and outputs of the DIO card. Pressing and holding a switch connected to input channel number one will activate output channel number one; pressing the switch on channel number two will activate output channel number two; and so on.

When the switch is released the output is turned OFF. This allows you to test the operation of a station switch and LED.

The audio channels on 200 series DIOs (i.e. DIO 2xx) are tested by pressing a switch connected to an input channel. The first switch press will connect the master audio to channel number one; the second switch press will connect the master audio to channel number two; the third to channel three and so on. When channel 48 is reached, the next switch press will wrap the connection back to channel one.

Note: The operations of the audio channels will be changed in the next version of the software to match that of the digital outputs.

SPC functional test

This tests inputs and outputs of the SPC card. The card can be tested functionally using the installed switches and indicator lights. A special test board is available to test the switch inputs and logic level outputs to be tested at the SPC card.

RDB and RRB functional test

This tests the CPU, memory, and the complete CEPT link. You need a loopback cable to perform this test. For more information on this functional test see the Troubleshooting Guide.

Remove Card

If you wish to take a card out of service you can use the *remove card* selection. When you select *remove card*, the following screen will appear:



Section 8 - Data Logging

In This Section...

We will discuss:

• the type of events that are logged by the system, and the log message content,

- log functions,
- options for continuous printing of log messages,
- how to view log messages, and
- how to print or save selected log messages.

Data Logging

The Service, Administration and Control (SAC) computer logs all significant events, including intercom activities and alarms.

For each event, the following information is recorded:

- the time at which the event occurred,
- exchange number, and
- a message that describes the event.

A typical log message looks like this:

<u>Time</u> Message

09:51:07 Call Request from Station #5006 [intercom station name] sent to Master #5 [master station name]

Note: The exchange number is used for large systems with multiple exchanges.

The time appears at the bottom of the screen for the message line that the cursor is on.

For logging purposes, an "event" is an activity that occurs at a point in time. A call request would generate the following events:

When the call request is initiated, the first event is logged:

Call Request from Station [ID/name] sent to Master [ID/name]

When the call request is acknowledged i.e. a call is made, three more events are logged:

Connected Master [ID/name] to Station [ID/name]

Call Request from Station [ID/name] removed from Master [ID/name] Active queue

Call Request from Station [ID/name] added to Master [ID/name] Acknowledged queue

When the call request is canceled i.e. the call is ended, and two additional events are logged:

Disconnected Master [ID/name] from Station [ID/name]

Call Request from Station [ID/name] removed from Master [ID/name] Acknowledged queue

These logged messages form a historical record of all activities, which can be printed or reviewed at a later time.

Log Message File

The system's log message file has sufficient capacity to save approximately one month's messages, under normal conditions of operation. When the file's capacity is reached, the system will begin to overwrite messages. The oldest message is the first to be overwritten, so that the file always contains the most recent messages. The log file is a circular buffer that can be set to store up to a maximum of 99,9999,99 entries (for both the Admin and Maint log entries). The maximum size of the circular buffer will depend on the capacity of the hard drive. In older systems, with small capacity hard drives, the number of log messages in the circular buffer was set to 200,000.

Note that the user can access the log message files either from the Maintenance or the Administration menus. The screens shown for access to the log message files in this manual are from the Administration menu.

Log Functions

The Log Functions that are available - Exchange, Log Level, Open Viewer, Multi Viewer and No. Log Records

Exchange for systems that have more than one exchange (computer) each exchange will

have its own log file. You can select which exchange log file or files to view with

the Multi Viewer selection

Log Level allows you to select user information, debug information or both.

Open Viewer allows you to view the log message file for the computer you are at. If you

choose Open Viewer without first selecting log level the system will assume that

you want user information only.

Multi Viewer In systems with more than one exchange, each creating its own log file, the log

files selected under Exchange can be viewed.

No. Log Records The user can set the number of log records that will be maintained. Both the


number of Maint and Admin records can be set. The maximum number of

records that can be set is 99,9999,999.

Log Level

When you select *Log Level*, a second menu appears on the screen beside the log menu.


You may select user information and/or debug information. For operations purposes, you should select user information. Only the system manufacturer, system installer, or maintenance staff should require debug information for problem solving.



Open Viewer

You must select *Open Viewer* to view the log message file stored at the computer you are accessing the log data from. If you have not selected a log level the system will assume that you want to view User information. To open the viewer press 'o' for *Open Viewer*. A screen message "Viewing activity on this exchange." Will appear on the bottom of the screen, followed by the message "Using User log levels."

Log Data

You may view, print or save log data to a floppy disk.

When you select Open Viewer, log message data will appear on the screen in the shaded area of the following screen display. At present 21 log messages can be displayed at one time. Each page of log messages contains 21 messages; if we page back the top message will become the last message on the next screen.

Function Keys

You may use the following function keys to view and select log data to save or print.

Right Arrow	Scroll right, will move the text to the left (if the message is longer than the width of the screen). The Col # will tell you how many columns are off screen to the left.
Left Arrow	Scroll left, will move the text to the right. (You cannot move the text Col # less than 1)
Down Arrow	Will move you to the next log line (towards newer entries).
Up Arrow	Will move you to the previous log line (towards older entries).
PgDn	Will move you to the next page of logs (towards newer entries).
PgUp	Will move you to previous page of logs (toward older entries).
+	Allows you to type in the number of pages to jump down, then will move you that number of pages down in the logs (toward newer entries).
-	Allows you to type in the number of pages to jump up, and then will move you that number of pages up in the logs (toward older entries).
Home	Jumps to the first log line (the oldest entry).
End	Jumps to the last log line (the newest entry).
/ (search down)	Allows you to type in a search string, then looks down in the logs (towards newer entries) until the string is found or until the newest entry is reached.
? (search up)	Allows you to type in a search string, and then looks up in the logs (towards older entries) until the string is found or until the oldest entry is reached.

Viewing Log Data

If the log message you are looking for is not displayed on the screen, you may scroll up or down, using Up-arrow and Down-arrow keys or PgUp and PgDn keys. Arrow keys will move the cursor one line at a time. Page keys will move the cursor one page at a time.

If the log message extends beyond the border of your screen, you may scroll across, using the Right-arrow and Left-arrow keys. The Col # will tell you how many columns you have scrolled off the screen to the left.

Printing or Saving Log Data

First you must select log data that you want to print or save.

The keys at the bottom of the screen will help you to select blocks for printing. A block is a set of log messages that are contiguous (listed one after the other).

To select a single block of log messages for printing or saving.

Move the cursor to the log message you want and press 'B' (Block). The line you have selected will be highlighted. Now move the cursor up or down (using arrow keys or page keys) to select additional messages. Each time you move the cursor additional messages are highlighted. When you reach the end of the block press 'B'.

To select multiple blocks of log messages for printing or saving



Searching for Particular Log Messages

You can search for a particular log message using the /, ?, or n keys. The / key searches down (toward newer log messages), the? key searches up (toward older log entries), and the n key searches in the current direction looking for the next occurrence of the current search string. The next (n) search function can only be started after you have specified a direction and string with the / or ? search keys

When you type in a '/' or '?' you will see the following display:

Type in the string you are looking for (this is case sensitive so only the exact case will be searched for), and then press 'Enter'.

The log viewer will then scroll through the logs n the specified direction, and will stop when the search string is found anywhere in a log line, or until the top or bottom of the logs is reached.

Appendix 3 - Tone Generation

The format for tone generation is based on dividing the period into four equal time slots. Two binary bits encode each time slot. The encoding is as follows:

00	No output.
01	Frequency sweeps from Start Freq. to End Freq. (or initial frequency to End Freq.).
11	Frequency is constant at the value just before the 1/4 time interval time slot begins. If the previous time slot had a value of 00 then the constant output frequency is Start Freq.
10	Frequency sweeps from End Freq. to Start Freq. (or 0 if next time slot is encoded 00)


This information is encoded into a two digit hex number. Dividing the 1/4 period time slot into equal sub-intervals, defined by the Num Steps and changing the frequency by an equal amount in each sub-interval accomplish the "sweep" in frequency. The format pattern is encoded in reverse order of the pattern that is desired i.e. if a frequency pattern of 00 01 11 10 is required it should be entered as 10 11 01 00

The generated waveform would be as follows:



By increasing the Num Steps the frequency sweep will sound closer to a continuously changing frequency, rather than sounding as though there are abrupt changes in frequency.
